"Are you buying for a pantry?"

"Where is the pantry located?"

"It looks like you have a lot. Could we give you some cash to help buy the groceries?"

Every question was a divine appointment to share God's provision for us with the other folks in line. As the cashier totaled things up, he said, "That will be \$799.98."

O n e hundred, two hundred, then

up to seven hundred. Now I am into the smaller bills. Seven-fifty, seven-sixty, sevenseventy, seven-eighty. I looked at the amount I had written on the front of the bag: \$776. I kept going: Seven-ninety, ninety-one, ninetytwo, ninety-three, ninety-four, finally I got to ninety-nine.

I handed him one more dollar. I had one dollar left. The cashier's reaction was priceless.

"Whoa!"

I told him, "Isn't God good?"


He just smiled.

Help the USPS Stamp Out Hunger in 2012

ay 12 marks the U.S. Postal Service's 2012 Stamp Out Hunger event, and Servant's Heart is once again both participating and benefitting. That day, postal clients leave bags of nonperishable food items at the base of their mailboxes for pickup by postal carriers. Donations collected by the Beech Grove and Garfield branches of the post office go directly to Servant's Heart. Servant's Heart needs several volunteers throughout the day.

"We're going to have two shifts at each post office, and we need about 15 people at each post office for each shift," explains Servant's Heart chairman Bill Boone. "We'll also have a third shift in the evening, actually at the Servant's Heart pantry, to unload the truck. We need six people for that work."

Shift times are 10 a.m.-12:30 p.m., and 12:30-3:00 p.m., at the Beech Grove post office; at Garfield Park, times are noon-3:00 p.m., and 3:00-6:00 p.m.; and 6:00 to 7:30 p.m. at the Servant's Heart pantry.

Last year's Stamp Out Hunger event netted 14,287 pounds of nonperishable food for Servant's Heart on the actual event day, and an additional 525 pounds at a later date, picked up at the downtown post office. Bill says that amount lasts only about 6 weeks and adds that the number of people needing assistance continues to spiral.

"Each week, each family we help gets eight canned goods, so you can understand how quickly we go through our inventory of canned vegetables."

here's a saying that goes something like this: "You have never really lived until you have done something for someone who can never repay you."

Jeff and Connie Davis are living. *Really* living.

Jeff, a plumber for 43 years, and Connie, a realtor for 24 years, have volunteered for a wide array of secular and faith-based organizations throughout their marriage. Among their past stints, Jeff has donated his plumbing skills to Triton Schools and Brookeville Road Community Church; Connie has served as a youth group volunteer at her former church and as a past PTO president when the couple's children were in

school. Through MIBOR (Metropolitan Board of Realtors), she also has helped homeless people get established in rentals through the Bonner Center located at 10th and Jefferson streets in Indianapolis.

Today, Jeff and Connie team up at Servant's Heart. Connie, who has been part of Servant's Heart since its inception nearly 9 years ago, works in the office, checking

clients on the third Thursday of every month. Jeff primarily helps clients check out—bagging their goods and helping carry sacks for clients who need that extra assistance.

Before Jeff joined the ministry, there was no mistaking the joy and gratification that exuded from his wife's face as she came home each week from the pantry—and her joy was contagious. He became part of the ministry 6 years after his wife started working at the pantry.

"Connie would work at Servant's Heart and come home, satisfied and full of joy," he remembers. "I just didn't understand the reward. But now, this feeling of serving those in need has been such a satisfying feeling—a feeling coming from the Lord."

Connie adds, "I can't explain why working [at Servant's Heart] and helping people lifts my spirit, but we have people who are so thankful that we are there. The most satisfying part of



working at Servant's Heart is being able to show the love and generosity of Christ. You can't help but be thankful for what the Lord has done for you. Jeff and I are continually commenting on how the Lord brought two inner-city kids together and blessed us in our marriage."

Connie recalls the first time she set eyes on the love of her life—at a party.

"I was 16 and in high school, and Jeff was 20. Jeff was standing in the kitchen watching the adults play cards. I asked about him and was told "he's engaged," which he was not. I of course continued to ask until it got around to him that I was interested. We had our first date June 17, 1972. We were pretty inseparable after that. I did

> have to keep Jeff's age a secret from my dad because of the age difference. We got married 3 years later in April 1975. We both feel God has truly blessed us and watched over us when we were so young, but He had a plan for our lives and after 37 years, the love continues to grow due to Him."

> The couple, both of whom graduated from Tech High School, resides in the northwest corner of Shelby

County. They have two grown children, Kelly and Ethan.

When the Davises aren't working or volunteering, Jeff and Connie enjoy antiquing and fixing up old houses. They also have been avid Scrabble players for nearly their entire marriage.

"We kept records of highest word score and highest game score in the lid of the box," Connie recalls. "Looking back, we cannot seem to get back to those high scores yet. We are pretty evenly matched and are competitive. The last couple of games, I have really knocked his socks off, but I'm sure he will come back and get me!"

Words are important to them—but it is *The Word* that is central to their lives. Connie uses Prov. 3:6 to guide her: "In all thy ways, acknowledge Him and He will direct thy path." Jeff cites Matt. 19:26 as his favorite verse: "With God, all things are possible." Indeed.
